# Caving

Fall from height	Staff and participants - Death	<ul> <li>Any ascent/descent routes within the cave or routes involving being at height will be protected and managed by the qualified instructor using spotting or use of ropes.</li> </ul>	No further action at this time
Flooding	Staff and participants - Drowning	<ul> <li>Qualified Instructor on activity to have specific sites on their cave leader qualification and good knowledge of how cave reacts in adverse weather conditions.</li> <li>Instructor to assess the weather conditions (Proceeding, current and forecast) and should weather conditions indicate the likelihood of flooding, a venue less affected by the weather should be used.</li> </ul>	No further action at this time
Uneven ground	Staff and participants - tripping	<ul> <li>Instructor to brief the group on the hazards associated with the venue.</li> </ul>	No further action at this time
Lose rock, bad air	Staff and participants - Serious injury	<ul> <li>Venues used approved by Local Cave Leader Training Panel and monitored by PICA (Peak Instructed Cave Affiliation). Any new hazard spotted will be immediately reported to PICA, and use of the venue will be suspended if necessary.</li> </ul>	No further action at this time
Mine hazards, e.g. 'miner's deads' (loose rocks), shafts in the floor, unstable ground	Staff and participants - Serious injury	<ul> <li>Venues used approved by Local Cave Leader Training Panel and monitored by PICA (Peak Instructed Cave Affiliation). PICA regularly inspects mine venues to check on the stability and safety of approved routes. Any new hazard spotted will be immediately reported to PICA, and use of the venue will be suspended if necessary.</li> </ul>	No further action at this time

# **Introductory Caving**

### Operating procedures

#### **Instructor requirements:**

 Current First Aid, LCMLA level 1 Mine and LCMLA Level 1 Cave / appropriate in-house training (Cave only)

#### **Key briefing points:**

All participants should be wearing appropriate clothing for the trip planned; caving over suits or waterproofs will be provided. Wellington boots are appropriate footwear; the instructor should advise all participants to wear long socks.

The instructor should always carry a first aid kit and spare lighting. Additional safety equipment, including an emergency shelter, sleeping bag and hot drinks, may be taken if necessary.

Each participant must wear a correctly fitting caving helmet and light.

The group should be appropriately briefed before the session. The importance of staying together, helping each other and additional hazards, including road traffic (especially when visiting Mouldridge Mine), loose rock and water, should be highlighted.

The instructor should always be in a suitable position to supervise the whole group.

All equipment used should meet UIAA/CEN specifications and /or be suitable for their purpose.

Instructors should inspect all equipment at the start of any session and remove any item they are not happy with for inspection by the Head of the Centre.

All instructors must keep up to date concerning hazards and access through reference to DCA (Derbyshire Caving Association) and PICA (Peak Instructed Caving Association)



# Caving with Pitches

## Operating procedures

#### Instructor requirements:

Current First Aid, Relevant NGB awards for the activity and or site-specific trained with relevant experience

#### **Key briefing points:**

All participants should be wearing appropriate clothing for the trip planned; caving over suits or waterproofs will be provided. Wellington boots are appropriate footwear; the instructor should advise all participants to wear long socks.

The instructor should always carry a first aid kit and spare lighting. Additional safety equipment, including an emergency shelter, sleeping bag and hot drinks, may be taken if necessary.

Each participant must wear a correctly fitting caving helmet, light, harness or belt, and leg loops.

The group should be appropriately briefed before the session. The importance of staying together, helping each other and additional hazards including traffic, loose rock, water and other users should be highlighted.

The instructor should always be in a suitable position to supervise the whole group.

All equipment used should meet UIAA/CEN specifications and /or should be suitable for their purpose.

Instructors should inspect all equipment at the start of any session and remove any item they are not happy with for inspection by the Head of the Centre.
